## Northeastern Summer Electricity Market Alert Friday, July 19, 2013

The National Weather Service declared an excessive-heat warning for much of the Mid-Atlantic and northeastern United States, including major electric markets covering Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, D.C., and New York City. This report highlights the wholesale electricity market activity occurring in response to the higher-than-normal electricity demand caused by the heat wave.

## Heat wave expected to peak today with a cool off tomorrow

**Temperature:** The heat wave is forecast to peak today, with the highest temperatures nearing triple digits across the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic.

**Electricity prices:** Day-ahead prices for certain peak hours reached above \$200/MWh in New England and PJM West, above \$300/MWh in New York City, and hit \$350/MWh in Long Island. Usual prices for these areas are \$30-\$60/MWh. The on-peak daily price at PJM West continued to decline from its Wednesday peak as the heat moved out of the Midwest.

**Electricity demand:** System demand in New York is expected to surpass its all-time system peak while PJM and New England are forecast to be 96% and 99% of their respective all-time peaks.

**Natural gas prices:** Prices for natural gas declined slightly across much of the nation in trading yesterday. However, spot gas prices in New England remained elevated at \$5.97/MMBtu, \$2.29/MMBtu higher than the benchmark Henry Hub in Louisiana (\$3.68). Prices settled yesterday in New York City and at Texas Eastern's M3 Hub in southeastern Pennsylvania at \$5.08/MMBtu and \$3.82/MMBtu, respectively.

**Transmission and generator outages:** Susquehanna 1 and Limerick 1 (both in Pennsylvania), Hope Creek (in New Jersey) and Pilgrim (in Massachusetts) nuclear units will be operating at reduced capacity today.

**System alerts:** New York's grid operator called on emergency demand response for a third day in a row while PJM did so yesterday for its central Ohio sub-region. ISO-New England continued appeals for conservation.
